Background

Right to Access Nepal (RAN) is a non-political, non-profit, and non-governmental organization established in 2009 A.D. (2066 B.S.) and registered with the District Administration Office, Kathmandu, under the Organization Registration Act, 1977 (2034 B.S.). The organization is also affiliated with the Social Welfare Council (SWC) and has been duly registered with the relevant District Administration Offices in the districts where it has implemented development programs.

Since its establishment, RAN has been committed to promoting inclusive, equitable, and sustainable development through community-based initiatives. Over the years, the organization has successfully implemented a wide range of development programs in Tanahun, Kaski, Lalitpur, Kathmandu, Bhaktapur, Chitwan, Ramechhap, Gorkha, Rasuwa, Nuwakot, Manang, Mustang, Banke, Surkhet, Dailekh, Kalikot, and Salyan districts, working in partnership with government agencies, development partners, local governments, and communities.

RAN is governed by a nine-member Executive Committee, elected by the organization's General Assembly every two years in accordance with its constitution. The organization firmly upholds the principles of inclusive leadership, gender equality, social inclusion (GESI), transparency, and participatory governance. The Executive Committee reflects Nepal's social diversity, with representation from women, Dalit, Indigenous (Janajati), and Madhesi communities, ensuring that organizational leadership remains inclusive and representative.

Since its inception, RAN has actively contributed to local, provincial, and national development priorities by implementing evidence-based and community-centered programs. The organization has successfully implemented projects in Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH), education, social mobilization, community development, good governance, transparency, accountability, child-friendly local governance, gender equality and social inclusion (GESI), Right to Information (RTI), social accountability, public hearings, social audits, HIV/AIDS awareness, drinking water, total sanitation, and public health promotion.

RAN has also collaborated with government institutions and development partners to strengthen local governance and citizen participation. Notably, the organization implemented community dialogue and governance initiatives in partnership with the Local Governance and Accountability Facility (LGAF) and has facilitated various social accountability mechanisms—including public hearings, social audits, and citizen engagement forums to enhance transparency, improve public service delivery, and strengthen the relationship between citizens and local governments.

Through its commitment to professionalism, accountability, and community empowerment, RAN continues to work toward building inclusive, resilient, and self-reliant communities while contributing to Nepal's sustainable development goals.

Membership

Right to Access Nepal (RAN) is governed by a diverse and inclusive membership structure that promotes democratic governance, gender equality, and social inclusion. The organization was founded by **nine members**, including **six women and three men**, with representation from **Dalit, Madhesi, Indigenous (Janajati), and other communities**, reflecting its commitment to inclusive leadership from its inception.

The organization is currently managed by a **nine-member Executive Board**, elected through the General Assembly in accordance with the organization's constitution. The Board represents

diverse social groups and provides strategic leadership, policy guidance, and oversight for the organization's governance and program implementation.

RAN currently has **24 General Members**, comprising **7 women and 17 men**, who actively participate in the General Assembly, contribute to organizational decision-making, and support the achievement of RAN's vision and mission through democratic participation and institutional accountability.

Vision / Goal

To empower women, youth, children, and marginalized communities by strengthening their capacities to exercise their constitutional rights and access quality education, healthcare, sustainable livelihoods, social protection, the Right to Information (RTI), and other essential public services, while contributing to inclusive community and infrastructure development.

- **Enhance Institutional and Community Capacity:** Provide training, technical assistance, mentoring, and capacity-building support to local governments, community-based organizations (CBOs), civil society organizations (CSOs), schools, and other stakeholders.
- **Promote Awareness and Social Responsibility:** Facilitate awareness campaigns, community dialogues, advocacy initiatives, training programs, and public discussions to strengthen civic responsibility, social inclusion, and active citizenship.
- **Conduct Research and Assessments:** Undertake baseline surveys, end-line evaluations, needs assessments, research studies, monitoring, and impact evaluations to support evidence-based planning and decision-making.
- **Improve Livelihoods and Economic Empowerment:** Promote entrepreneurship, vocational skills development, income-generating activities, financial literacy, and microenterprise development to reduce poverty and enhance sustainable livelihoods.
- **Strengthen Community Institutions:** Facilitate community organization, group formation, leadership development, savings and credit mobilization, and cooperative development to promote self-reliance and community resilience.
- **Promote Development Communication:** Produce and disseminate educational and awareness materials through radio, television, digital media, and other communication platforms to increase public awareness and support positive social change.
